On March 10, 2019, the State Officers and their wives/mother attended a Founder's Day Dinner hosted by Council 13112 in Greenville. I want to thank Council 13112 for providing us with a terrific dinner in celebrating and honoring the founder of the Knights of Columbus, Fr. Michael J. McGivney. To me, it is amazing that this organization is celebrating over 136 years of providing charitable works for those in need, while maintaining the vision and dream of Fr. McGivney which continues to be strong after all of these years. The only way to continue Fr. # From the Vocations Director

The Democratic Republic of the Congo is slowly recovering from a conflict known as Africa's first world war, which led to the loss of some five million lives between 1994 and 2003, but many eastern areas are still plagued by violence as rebel groups continue to operate there. The Adorno Fathers came to this area in 1984 and were right in the middle of the Hutu killing of the Tutsis. In three separate incidences in 2016, one member of the order was kidnapped, one shot in the leg, and another shot four times as he drove to one of their outlying missions on Palm Sunday to celebrate Mass. The village of Nyamilima was recaptured by the DRC in 2005 but it is still not the safest place to travel.

I was asked by the new Father General of the Adorno Fathers, Father Ted Kalaw CRM (known as the Carocciolini Fathers in Italy and Africa) to travel with him last month on his first visit to Africa to see where the US could help to support their missions in Africa. The Adorno Fathers have three parishes in the diocese; Spartanburg, Sumter and Goose Creek. The Order has 100 priests worldwide with another 180 seminarians in various stages of formation. It took us over 4 hours from Goma on unpaved roads to reach the village. Every 15 minutes or so we would see a government outpost with 2 soldiers guarding the road.

When the village was overthrown by rebels in the early 1990's, the Adorno Fathers stepped in to provide all services. Today, the parish covers over 800 square miles with a population of 70,000, with 60,000 Catholics. They have one main church which seats 3.000 and 13 mission churches, run the only hospital with 104 beds, with 9 clinics, generates their own electricity for the parish buildings and hospital. They run 49 schools with 14,000 students. The homes are very tiny, most built of clay with dirt floors and no electricity or running water. You rarely see a car and the main means of transportation is walking or an occasional moped. No need for a church parking lot. The average wage is \$2 a day. But they are the happiest people you could ever meet. The three Sunday and one Saturday night Mass are packed with over 10,000 attending and choirs of more than 100 people at each Mass. The children's Mass has over 4,000 in attendance with the children standing in the aisles.

I attended a 6am weekday Mass with over 400 in attendance. Off to one side of the church, I was pleasantly surprised to see a group of scouts in the pews. At the consecration, a group of 6 scouts moved forward to form an honor guard in front of the altar. After Mass, Father Faustin Kambale, African Superior Delegate of the Order, introduced me to the troop.

# **England of Ireland**

As the strong right arm of the Church, it is hard for us South Carolina Knights of Columbus to imagine not having a strong relationship with our Bishop and priests. But in the early nineteenth century, South Carolina was part of the Archdiocese of Baltimore.

By 1819, Catholics in Charleston, SC had established a trusteeship system (which governed the parish Church) and threatened schism. Rome responded by creating the Diocese of Charleston – the seventh diocese in the United States. The Diocese of Charleston was established by Pope Pius VII on July 11, 1820.


Its first shepherd was Bishop John England, who was born in Cork, Ireland. At the time of his appointment to the Diocese of Charleston he was parish priest at Bandon, a town about 16 miles from Cork. He was consecrated bishop in St. Fin-

bar's Church in Cork on September 21, 1820 and arrived in Charleston December 30, 1820.

When Bishop England came to Charleston, James Monroe was President of the United States, Thomas Bennett was Governor of South Carolina and Elias Horrey was Mayor of the City of Charleston. The new diocese of 142,000 square miles was spread over three states, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. There were two churches, one in Charleston (St. Mary of the Annunciation on Hasell Street) and one in Augusta, GA (The Church of the Most Holy Trinity.) Only six priests were available to serve the handful of scattered Catholics.

Bishop England brought order to the diocese, traveling to wherever Catholics lived. He organized parishes, built churches, and recruited priests. In Charleston, he founded a seminary and a college of classical learning as well as an academy for young women and a religious order to help catechize both the free black women and slaves. To educate his flock, he wrote an English catechism and an English missal. He also launched the first diocesan newspaper in the United States – *The United States Catholic Miscellany*.

Respected by Catholics and Protestants alike for his preaching, charity and personal poverty, Bishop John England, the first Bishop of Charleston, died of a fever April 11, 1842; 177 years ago this month.



# From the State Ceremonials Chairman

Supremes' first, preferred and long-standing primary method is that the certified degree team members deliver their respective charges from memory and in an inspiring manner.

Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson has approved two additional methods of conducting the first degree.

The second method is the degree team members are allowed to read and/or deliver from memory their respective charge and the third method, approved on January 27, 2014, is using the DVD in which the first degree ceremonial is recorded with pauses for the selected degree team members to take certain actions. With these three different options for conducting first degrees, there is no justification for a council not to conduct their own first degree every month.

Ensuring the growth of the Order today and in the future must be a priority for fraternal leaders at every level of the Order. All the good we offer to our Church and communities depends on councils continuously welcoming more and more qualified Catholic men into our ranks. To that end, councils are authorized to host First Degree exemplifications using a new Supreme Council-produced video presentation of our initiation ceremonial.

It must be noted that many councils maintain certified First-Degree teams that render an outstanding service by exemplifying the principles of the Order through the live presentation of our degrees. Live degrees remain the preferred method by which candidates are to be admitted and advanced through

Dear Brother Knights,

**Lent** is wrapping up, but that doesn't mean the spirit of lent is over. Until Easter arrives we still have time to connect with God and put the finishing touch on our relationship with Him. Always remember that God never leaves us, it is we who leave Him. We leave Him when we say, 'I'm going to give in to my decision to do anything contrary to His design for our welfare'. With that in mind, what has God designed for each of us personally? In a nutshell, the answer is: Perfect union with Him. How do we achieve this Union? Through prayer, grace, personal cooperation with the promptings of the Holy Spirit, love of neighbor, and forgiveness. FOR-GIVENESS IS CRITICAL. Forgiveness is necessary in two areas: First, we much forgive absolutely everyone who has hurt us. Sometimes it takes a few hours or days for the boiling blood to retreat. As soon as it does, immediately pronounce the words to yourself, "I forgive that person". Just do it! Secondly, learn to forgive yourself. If you are like me, I am very reluctant to forgive myself. I am learning that not being able to forgive myself is very harmful to the process of doing God's Will. If I cannot repent AND forgive myself, I'll never feel worthy to do the things God has chosen for me to do for Him. Jesus forgave the soldiers that hung Him on the cross; he forgave the repentant thief on the cross; and, He will ALWAYS forgive us of our offenses if we are sorry for them. On Easter Sunday, give Jesus a gift: Promise Him you will go to confession once a month (more often if necessary). Let Jesus heal you through the sacrament of reconciliation.

# From the State Protocol Chairman

#### PROTOCOL

Worthy Grand Knights, Faithful Navigators and Members of the State Council:

#### **DIGNITARIES AT MEETINGS**

When Priests, State Officers, District Masters, District Deputies, or special guests are present at a meeting they should be accorded due recognition for the office or position they hold. They should always be seated in a place of honor.

If a Priest, State Officer, District Master, District Deputy, or special guest should arrive while a meeting is in progress; the presiding officer raps the gavel three times for all to stand and instructs the Warden to escort the guest to the station of the presiding officer. The presiding officer then offers a seat of honor to the guest.

However, a State Officer, Vice Supreme Master or District Master or District Deputy, when present at his home council or assembly, need not be specifically recognized unless he has been invited to attend in his official capacity or requests to be so recognized. This will allow the officer to engage in the regular business of his home council or assembly without involving the position he holds.

When a General Agent or Field Agent is present at a meeting, he should be treated as a guest. He should be seated and introduced with the dignitaries.

Little did I know, until later, that he was the Scout Chaplain for the Diocese of Goma. The troops chaplain, is also a scout, on his pastoral year, being ordained to the priesthood next March. At the Orders house of Theology in Nairobi, I met another scout in his 3<sup>rd</sup> year of Theology.

The troop meets every Tuesday morning, starting with Mass then a troop meeting. The meeting starts on a field with pole with the international scout symbol in the center. They honored me by presenting me with a troop neckerchief. The meeting then continued with song and dance in which I tried to participate. I was very honored to see scouting alive and well in this isolated part of the world.

The next day, four priests and I traveled one hour to the Virunga National Park with four scouts tucked into the back of the vehicle. Well inside the Park, was one of the Adorno missions and we were greeted by 600 screaming school children happy to the new Father General. The scouts helped to provide crowd control. As we approached the clinic in the village, we saw another gathering space and pole for scouts. Little did I know that Virunga National Park was only opened a few weeks before to tourists because of kidnappings of tourists within the Park last year. The Park is on the border with Uganda where only 10 miles away a US tourist and her guide were recently kidnaped.

It is amazing what one Catholic Order of priests have done in just 35 years to provide stability and a faith life to the people in this region. The church in Nyamilima provides all services except security.


The Adorno Fathers presently have 30 priests in Africa, but next year, they will ordain 10 young men to spread the good news. It was a blessing to see the Catholic Church and Scouting to be such a vibrant part of the lives of the people in this very remote part of the world.
