While most of us have become accustomed to sheltering in place, to holding virtual meetings and online Exemplifications, life is slowly getting back to normal.

While it might be easier to say, let us wait until after this passes, that is not what the generations of Knights did before us. My brother, I ask you to think where we would be today if Fr McGivney took such an approach? I highly encourage thinking outside the box and challenging yourself, as well as your council officers, to achieve this high distinction. For if you do, I truly believe you will be setting your Council up for success for many years to come.

From the Vocations Director

During the Coronavirus, we have been participating in the Mass from our home and watching the diocesan feed from the Chancery. On May 3rd, it was Good Shepherd Sunday and World Day of prayer for vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. The homily was given by one of our seminarians, Deacon Michael Cellars. The sign of a good homily is that its message sticks with you for a long time. He will make a good priest once he is ordained. Thank you to all of the councils that have supported him for many years. Below is part of his homily.

"It is important to understand that our principal vocation in life is not something that we choose. It is a calling from the Lord that he implants in each of us. And through prayer and discernment we can come to have a better understanding not only of who we are but what we are called to be. Our own vocations are personal. The Lord calls each of us individually.

Pope Francis reminds us, those called to the priesthood and religious life is that we are to be people of mission. Our vocations should not merely remain in the confines of our churches or convents. No, our vocation is one of service. It is to be out in the world, to the point of smelling like our sheep.

The priesthood is no easy task. For many the priesthood can be physically, mentally, spiritually, and emotionally draining. Our priests work very, very hard and mostly behind the scenes. This may look like a priest that has woken up in the middle of the night to rush to the hospital to be with someone in the final moments of their life. This can be hearing hours and hours of confession, helping to be reconciled to God through his mercy and love.

Friends, the calling of the Lord to the priesthood and Consecrated Life is radical because it is a calling to follow the Good Shepherd wherever he takes us and to act as a good shepherd for the faithful and to stand ahead of them and to protect them at all costs from those that would lead our flock astray.

It is no secret that our seminaries are not overflowing. Many of our faithful shepherds are going gray, bent, and broken from a life of sacrifice that they all readily accepted on that day of their ordination, you are a priest forever. To all of our priests, I would like to say thank you. Thank you for all that you have done for me, helping me to hear my own calling to the Lord. Thank you for being there, in the good times and the bad, at our Baptisms, our first Confessions, Communions and Confirmations, at our weddings and funerals. Thank you for your radical yes. I would like to ask all of you to take some time to think about the priests that have impacted your life and in a special way to pray for them. Lastly, I would ask you to pray for more vocations to the priesthood and Consecrated



From the State Protocol Chairman

Worthy Grand Knights, Faithful Navigators and Members of the State Council:

GREETING YOUR GUESTS

All guests should be greeted by the Grand Knight or Faithful Navigator. The Grand Knight or Faithful Navigator should be assisted by a committee whose function would be to care for the guests' coats, to introduce them to others in attendance and to answer any questions they may have.

Guests should not be left talking among themselves. They usually do not know many of your council or assembly members, and therefore should not be left alone for any period of time. Various persons should be altered to converse with and keep company with guests during their visit (not necessarily the same person or persons for the entire visit).

INTRODUCTIONS

Many if not most introductions involve people of unequal or different status or positions. They can differ in rank, in age or in sex, but the result is the same: an introduction usually consists of presenting one person of lesser importance or status to another of greater importance or status.

In introducing a group of people to an individual, avoid running through all the names without a break. It is better to introduce two or three people at a time, so that names can register properly. This is where use of name tags is most effective.

A form of acknowledgement used chiefly when meeting a group is repeating the name of the person to whom you have just been introduced.

Before introducing dignitaries at the head table, be certain names are spelled correctly and proper titles are used. It is a good idea to check the pronunciations of any names to be announced. The order of rank should be observed meticulously. A person who has been elected but has not yet taken office is called by the title of the office with – "elect" after the title. A Monsignor is not addressed as "Father" and a state officer is not addressed as "Brother." Remember, if you don't announce the name and title to the gathering, how can they be expected to know who the person is?




In your council, do you pray for vocations to come from your parish and your family? I would like to thank all of the councils that are supporting seminarians this year. Your prayers and support means so much to them.
