"Prayer"

Greetings My Brother Knights and wives! I pray that you all are feeling well and taking care of yourselves. I pray that you had a deeply spiritual Holy Week and a blessed Easter! For me, it was nice to see so many people back at the church for Mass! All praise be to God!

This month, I am writing about prayer/prayer life/praying. We all pray, right? And yes, we should have a prayer routine for everyday of the week. If you do not, I highly suggest that you develop a prayer routine/regime. While you are at it, be sure to include your wife, your children and/or your grandchildren as well. As you may know, clergy and the religious have prayer routines daily. For example, as a Deacon, we pray the Liturgy of the Hours in the morning and we pray the Liturgy of the Hours in the evening, as part of our prayer life as Deacons. Then for me, there are the bedtime prayers and the waking up prayers and the prayer/blessing before eating a meal. You can also add in praying the Rosary and praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet regularly. These prayer examples discussed are only to be of assistance to you in your own prayer life.

While researching for this article, I came across several definitions/examples for prayer/praying that I am going to share with you. Let us begin with a definition of prayer from the Catholic Book of Prayers, "Prayer is the path by which we can enter into intimate communion with God our Father, with Jesus, and with the Holy Spirit, our soul's most kindly Guest." According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, #2590, "Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." (St. John Damascene) The CCC #2591 states this about prayer, "God tirelessly

calls each person to this mysterious encounter with Himself. Prayer unfolds throughout the whole history of salvation as a reciprocal call between God and man."

The CCC, #2596 states, "The Psalms constitute the masterwork of prayer in the Old Testament. They present two inseparable qualities: the personal, and the communal. They extend to all dimensions of history, recalling God's promises already fulfilled and looking for the coming of the Messiah... (2597) the Psalms are an essential and permanent element of the prayer of the Church, suitable for men of every condition and time."

My Brothers, I suggest to you that the masterwork of prayer for us, from the New Testament age, is the Rosary. It was given to us by our Heavenly Mother to be prayed unceasingly. "The devotion of the holy Rosary has been treasured in the Church for centuries. It is a summary of Christian faith in language and prayers inspired by the Bible. It calls to mind the most important events in the lives of Jesus and Mary. These events are called Mysteries and tell of the life of Jesus and Mary." (Catholic Book of PRAYERS) As you know, the Rosary consists of seven prayers---the Sign of the Cross, the Apostles' Creed, the Our Father, the Hail Mary, the Glory Be, the Fatima Prayer, and the Hail, Holy Queen prayer.

I will close with these quotes: "Let your prayer be completely simple. For both the publican (tax collector) and the prodigal son were reconciled to God by a single phrase." (St. John Climacus) and "Prayer is a powerful tool given to us from God." (My brother Deacon, Deacon John Tempesco") And "The family that prays together, stays together." (Father Patrick Peyton) By the way, there is a program that you can watch en-

Brother Knights,

Last month I asked each of us if we believed enough in ourselves and in our principles of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity to invite others to become a Knight of Columbus. The question I have for you is, did you extend that invitation? If so, great and thank you. If not, why not? As fraternal leaders, we must set an example for others to follow. Yes, for some of us, this might be a challenge as we may not be an extrovert or loquacious. However, when we took on our respective leadership roles we by default became a motivator, mentor, learner, communicator, and navigator.

The reason I stress this is that our members look to us for guidance. Shortly we will be back to a new sense of normal, especially since all South Carolinians over the age of 16 are now eligible for vaccination coupled with the loosening of restrictions in our local communities and parishes. When we look at the CARA study for the past 10 years, which is done with the latest class of ordained priests each year, we see that the second highest indicator behind enrollment in Catholic schools, is that 30 percent are involved in scouting as a youth. We can see it in our own diocese with men like Eagle Scout Andrew Fryml or Eagle Scout seminarian Alex Foley who said that the first time that he ever thought of being a priest was when he heard a vocation talk at his religious emblems retreat in Scouting. There are very few leadership development programs available for youth today and we are blessed to have so many Knights actively involved with our youth in our parishes.

Many years ago, I met a Scoutmaster named Chuck Swoope from Troop 277 from St. Anne's in Rock Hill at the North Carolina Catholic Camporee. He was sad that he needed to take his troop to NC because there wasn't a camporee in SC. South Carolina did not have a diocesan Catholic Committee on Scouting so there was no SC Catholic Camporee. We started the Committee in the diocese with a small group of other concerned leaders and the programs have been growing ever since. Today there is a Catholic Camporee, Scout retreat, Bishop England Trek, Trail of Churches, Scout Convocation, scouts earning religious emblems increased 7 fold, and many opportunities for Catholic Scouts to grow in their faith.

Sadly, Chuck passed away at the beginning of the month. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus at St. Anne's but also involved in several other ministries. A wise man once told me that if you want to get something done right ask a busy man because he will get it done, Chuck led by example and was always there when I needed something done for Catholic Scouts. It is Knights like Chuck that are training the next generation of leaders in our diocese.

In my troop we ended our meetings with "May the great Scoutmaster of all Scouts be with us until we meet again". But Chuck had appropriately added an additional 7 words for his troop, "May the great Scoutmaster of all Scouts be with us until we meet again, and may our footsteps lead unto Him.".

From the State Protocol Chairman

Worthy Grand Knights, Faithful Navigators and Members of the State Council:

During this time of change it is important to keep social distance and wear your face mask when away from your home. COVID-19 has changed how are meetings are being conducted, and how fund raising and projects are being done with less people because of worrying about contracting the COVID-19. It is important to remember Protocol during the meeting, no matter the type being held. It is also important to remember your Church and Pastor need our help during Mass and on Church grounds as well as donations because of decreased attendance for several months as well as no attendance for several weeks of no in person Mass. Please step forward and ask your Pastor and Chaplin/Faithful Friar how he needs help as well as considering making a donation to him and the Church from council funds.

GREETING YOUR GUESTS

All guests should be greeted by the Grand Knight or Faithful Navigator. The Grand Knight or Faithful Navigator should be assisted by a committee whose function would be to care for the guests' coats, to introduce them to others in attendance and to answer any questions they may have.

Guests should not be left talking among themselves. They usually do not know many of your council or assembly members, and therefore should not be left alone for any period of time. Various persons should be altered to converse with and keep company with guests during their visit (*not necessarily the same person or persons for the entire visit*).

INTRODUCTIONS

Many if not most introductions involve people of unequal or different status or positions. They can differ in rank, in age or in sex, but the result is the same: an introduction usually consists of presenting one person of lesser importance or status to another of greater importance or status.

In introducing a group of people to an individual, avoid running through all the names without a break. It is better to introduce two or three people at a time, so that names can register properly. This is where use of name tags is most effective.

A form of acknowledgement used chiefly when meeting a group is repeating the name of the person to whom you have just been introduced.

Before introducing dignitaries at the head table, be certain names are spelled correctly and proper titles are used. It is a good idea to check the pronunciations of any names to be announced. The order of rank should be observed meticulously. A person who has been elected but has not yet taken office is called by the title of the office with – "elect" after the title. A Monsignor is not addressed as "Father" and a state officer is not addressed as "Brother." Remember, if you don't announce the name and title to the gathering, how can they be expected to know who the person is?
