Greeting Brother Knights,

I pray this finds you and your families doing well. We just completed our Grand Knight Midyear meeting, and I would like to thank all who attended. I also want to thank the State Officers and the members of Council 6847 for all their planning and efforts in making the meeting such a success.

It's hard to believe, but we've completed the first seven months of the fraternal year; and what seven months it has been! We've led the SE Region in membership intake in five of the first seven months, including winning in each of the last three months. Oh, by the way, we are currently leading in February as well. The numbers are very impressive; however, the real measure of success, what makes it all worthwhile, is what our new brothers will bring to our Order. What fresh ideas will help our councils with our Faith in Action programs; how many new brothers will be willing to accept officer and director positions in our councils; and, how much more support can we provide for our clergy who are working harder than ever and are in short supply. That is why membership is important and that is why we do what we do! If you personally have not recruited a new member this fraternal year, it is not too late to do so.

By the time this article is published we will have approximately four and a half months left in the fraternal year. There is a lot that will be happening between now and the end of the year and I want to share with you some key events and dates. The new Affiliate Member Initiative will roll out for South Carolina on March 1, 2022 and will close on March 31, 2022. Training for all Grand Knights and Financial Secretaries will be provided on February 15, 2022 at 8:00 pm. The purpose of the program is to move unresponsive members (those members who councils have been unable to get in touch with and who have not paid dues for at least the last 18 months). These members will be transferred out of their councils into a special council and will be managed by Supreme. A Fraternal Benefit Night – "Special Needs Planning Seminar" is scheduled for February 23, 2022 at 7:00 pm. Spread the word throughout the parish and register at https://register.gotowebinar.com/

From the Vocations Director

Our diocese is made up of approximately 1/3 of priests from our diocese, 1/3 of priests on loan from other dioceses and 1/3 religious orders. In recent years, many of the religious orders have had to cut back on priests because their numbers are shrinking. The recent departure of the Franciscans is a case in point.

The largest religious order in the diocese is the Adorno Fathers with nine priests serving Immaculate Conception in Goose Creek, Jesus Our Risen Savior in Spartanburg and St. Anne and St. Jude in Sumter. This is remarkable, since they only have 100 priests worldwide and over 175 in seminaries in third world countries.

Their first mission in Africa, was started in the Democratic Republic of the Congo in Nyamilima, on the Ugandan border 38 years ago. It was at ground zero during the deaths of 5 million during the fighting between the Hutu's and Tutsi's 28 years ago. For 12 years, Nyamilima was under rebel control. Today the area has 70,000 people with 60,000 Catholics. They are the poorest of the poor, with no electricity, or running water. The DRC provides very weak security, and the Adornos provide education, a hospital, and all other services for them. On any given Sunday 10,000 people walk to the 3 Masses at the main church, and there is not one car in the parking lot. They have 15,000 students in their 49 schools across the area. When the Adornos take on additional parishes in the region, they are given areas where no one else will go or where no parishes existed. It was left up to religious orders to build the churches and schools. Bishops will not send their diocesan priests into these areas. Caritas distributes its funding to the dioceses in Africa and the money rarely makes its way to the religious orders in the area. In 2001, the Adorno seminary in Goma was destroyed by a volcano.

The area that the Adorno's operate in is considered a red zone by the UN because of the constant attacks on the popula-



tion. On Palm Sunday in 2016, an Adorno priest was shot



saying that he soon may be "unable to provide Catholic priests for the military."

During his address at the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) general assembly in Baltimore, Archbishop Broglio of the Archdiocese for the Military Services (AMS), which serves United States military personnel and their families all over the world, said that even though many dioceses across the country are stretched, military service members and their families must not be forgotten.

"Indeed, I recognize that every archdiocese, diocese and eparchy is understaffed and struggling to meet the legitimate needs of the people entrusted to your pastoral care."

"It is not easy to ask you to sacrifice a young, physically fit priest to care for that portion of your flock that is out of sight and under my care as long as they are active-duty," the archbishop said, "but the dire situation leaves me few other viable options."

While one-fourth of military personnel and their families roughly 1.8 million people — are Catholic, there are only 208 priests in the Military Archdiocese to serve them, he added. This poses a serious problem, not only regarding providing access to the sacraments, but also leaving young servicemen and women and their families vulnerable to proselytization by other religions.

Next Year's Dire Straits

Next year, he said, at least 11 priests will be retiring from the Army or leaving due to medical reasons — a branch that was "heretofore stable." Similarly, the Navy, which provides chaplains for the Navy, the Marine Corps, and the Coast Guard has 48 priests, of whom 36 can be deployed. The Air Force also faces a drop from its current 56 priests. "The numbers mean that it will be almost impossible to ensure that men and women even in deployed locations and on aircraft carriers will have access to a Catholic priest," Archbishop Broglio stated.

"If the Armed Forces were ever to be completely without priests, most observers agree that they would soon be completely without chaplains of any kind," he said.

Military Chaplain Scholarship

The Knights of Columbus has established a scholarship program to help fund the education of seminarians preparing to become Catholic chaplains in the U.S. Armed Forces.

The program distributed \$1 million in scholarship money to the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, over a period of five years at a rate of \$200,000 per year. These funds, in turn, help produce a new generation of much-needed Catholic chaplains to minister to U.S. military personnel and their families. Fundraising for the Order wide project has been led by the Fourth Degree, the patriotic degree of the Knights.

The idea for the scholarship developed during Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson's visit to the aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower. While watching flight-qualifier tests with an assistant secretary of the U.S. Navy, the supreme knight had the opportunity to think about Catholics in uniform and the hardship they face of having to go weeks — and sometimes months — without being able to attend Mass or receive spiritual guidance from a priest.

"It can be very difficult for Catholic members of the armed forces when they're on forward deployments," Anderson said. "The U.S. military archdiocese, which supplies Catholic chaplains, estimates that it needs 800 priests to fully serve all of the Catholic men and women in uniform today, but they are only able to supply 208 — barely a fourth of the number needed." The military chaplain scholarship aims to provide a solution to this problem. According to Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, the scholarship money will be dedicated to the archdiocese's "Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program," which was initiated to recruit priestly vocations for the military for the benefit of the armed forces as well as participating dioceses and religious orders throughout the country. Through this program, the military archdiocese contracts with each participating diocese to fund 50 percent of the cost of a seminarian's five-year education — typically \$20,000 per year.

In return, the candidate agrees that, following ordination and three years of service at a parish, he will commit to serve as a military chaplain under the auspices of the military archdiocese for a minimum of three to five years. So far, the Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program has seen impressive results. Since its inception, the initiative has garnered an increase in co-sponsored seminarians, from seven in 2008 to 30 in 2010 to

43 in 2020. "These results, while extraordinary, place a large financial burden on the archdiocese, which annually generates only enough funds — 95 percent from donations — to cover its operating costs," said Archbishop Broglio, who joined the Order in 2007 while serving as the apostolic nuncio of the Dominican Republic.

"The archdiocese has no funds on hand to meet the long-term contractual commitments of the Co-Sponsored Seminarian Program, especially if, as it is hoped, the numbers continue to grow."

Fortunately, South Carolina exceeded its goal of \$4,000 a year for five years over 7 years ago.

4 times on the way to say Mass in a remote village and survived. On February 2nd, Adorno Father Richard Masivi, was gunned down allegedly by Muslim terrorists from the Allied Democratic Forces, a group linked to the Islamic State. The 36-year-old priest, who had been ordained for just three years, was killed by gunmen, after celebrating Mass on the World Day of Consecrated Life in the Catholic Church. The murder took place in the northeastern area of Lubero as Father Richard was driving back to his home parish of St. Michael the Archangel in Beni. There have been several attacks in recent times by the Allied Democratic Forces originating in Uganda. Father Richard was buried on Saturday, February 5th, on his 37th birthday. Please keep Father Richard, his family, and the Adorno Fathers in your prayers.

From the State Protocol Chairman

Ronald G. Povero, PSD, FM Worthy Grand Knights, Faithful Navigators and Members of the State Council:

DIGNITARIES AT MEETINGS

When Priests, State Officers, District Masters, District Deputies, or special guests are present at a meeting they should be accorded due recognition for the office or position they hold. They should always be seated in a place of honor.

If a Priest, State Officer, District Master, District Deputy, or special guest should arrive while a meeting is in progress; the presiding officer raps the gavel three times for all to stand and instructs the Warden to escort the guest to the station of the presiding officer. The presiding officer then offers a seat of honor to the guest.

However, a State Officer, Vice Supreme Master or District Master or District Deputy, when present at his home council or assembly, need not be specifically recognized unless he has been invited to attend in his official capacity or requests to be so recognized. This will allow the officer to engage in the regular business of his home council or assembly without involving the position he holds. When a General Agent or Field Agent is present at a

When a General Agent or Field Agent is present at a meeting, he should be treated as a guest. He should be seated and introduced with the dignitaries.

Human Relations

1. Speak to people. There is nothing as nice as a cheerful word of greeting.

2. Smile at people. It takes 72 muscles to frown — only 14 to smile.

3. Call people by name. The sweetest music to anyone's ears is the sound of his own name.

4. Be friendly and helpful. If you would have friends be friendly.



On December 1, 2021, Mississippi Attorney General Lynn Fitch will argue before the U.S. Supreme Court in favor of upholding the Mississippi law that outlaws abortion at 15 week gestational age. 
